Virginia Sheriffs' Association Workload Snapshot

- ▶ For the twelve-month period ending June 30, 2015, there were approximately two million calls for service with some Sheriffs' offices receiving over 150,000 calls for service.
- ▶ Patrol sizes for Sheriffs' Offices ranged up to 28 deputies. On average, four deputies were on patrol at any given time.
- ▶ In general, approximately 75% of the calls for service to Sheriffs' Offices required that a deputy be dispatched. Of those dispatched calls, approximately 20% required the back up of another deputy.

Executive Summary

- ▶ Approximately 70% of all Sheriffs' Offices report a School Resource Officer (SRO) program.
- ▶ Approximately 50% of all Sheriffs' Offices reported at least one Spanish-Speaking Deputy.
- ▶ Courts
 - ▶ Sheriffs' serve and secure all courts and serve over 3 million court process/papers per year.

▶ Jails

- ▶ Sheriffs' manage all local jails and serve on the board of regional jails. Currently 28,000 inmates.

▶ Mental Health Challenges

- ▶ Sheriffs responsibilities for mental health transportation drains law enforcement services.
 - ▶ Drop off centers work well.
 - ▶ Alternative transportation pilot reduces drain on law enforcement.
- ▶ Mental health patients in local jails drain jail resources, jails have become mental health institutions.

Effective August 10, 2015/ September 1, 2015
Passed and Awarded

- ▶ State Police
 - ▶ 2% across the board
 - ▶ \$240-\$2400 based on \$80/yr for 3-30 yrs of service (Compression)
- ▶ Department of Corrections
 - ▶ 2% across the board
 - ▶ \$1,000 special raise for Grade 7 & 8
 - ▶ \$325-\$1950 based on \$65/yr for 5-30 yrs of service (Compression)
- ▶ Other, Non-VSP, State funded LE Officers
 - ▶ 2% across the board
 - ▶ 2% special raise for Grade 8
 - ▶ \$325-\$1950 based on \$65/yr for 5-30 yrs of service (Compression)

Lost Pay Raises for Sheriffs Because of Revenue Trigger

- ▶ Compression at \$80.00 per year for sworn and \$65.00 per year for non-sworn.
- ▶ Across the board 2%
- ▶ Career Development Program for constitutional officers including deputy sheriffs.
